In Memoriam

We are sad to report that former Minister's Union manager Martha Bird passed away recently at the age of 92.

Martha and Paul Bird managed the MU (now ECOC) for eight years in the 1980's. The Bird-Werner House is named after her. Martha was the niece of Eunice Shaw, founder of the Minister's Union, and cousin of Eunice Bacon Shaw, long-time manager of the Minister's Union who died in 1991.

Martha was a teacher of the deaf and sign language interpreter for over 40 years. She and Paul loved to travel around the world, and took groups of deaf individuals on tour with them.

After Paul's death, Martha enjoyed coming to Chautauqua nearly every summer. She was the first person to make a pledge to finance the ECOC's recent renovations. Martha's sister, Winifred Minier, and the children of her sister Laura Minier Cook made a joint contribution of \$5,000 to the ECOC in Martha's memory.

Martha is survived by her sister, one son, Richard, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, nieces and nephews. ■

Dear Friends of ECOC,

We are looking forward to our 2013 season at Chautauqua. We are excited to see old friends and to make new ones.

Since the end of the 2012 season major work has continued to improve our three wonderful houses. Additional ceiling fans have been added in all buildings. Also:

In the Westervelt: Apartment A has been renovated for handicap accessibility, including new bathroom and kitchen areas; to improve access the 2nd and 3rd floors of the Westervelt have been connected to the elevator tower; and a few rooms have been painted.

In the Bird-Werner: An additional bathroom facility has been added to the 3rd floor and exhaust fans have been installed in the attic to help cool the 4th floor.

In the Shaw: Carpeting has been laid in the office and room 15.

During the Spring work weekend (May 31–June 2) and work week (June 14–21) additional projects will be added: new paint, new freezer in the Westervelt kitchen, a new refrigerator in the Bird-Werner kitchen plus other repairs and improvements.

The additional fans, freezer, refrig-

erator and Shaw stove (replaced last season) have been paid for with donations made by guests at the end of their stays last year, and continued donations will enable additional improvements.

The Season will soon be here and we will be enjoying the fellowship of our kitchens and porches, attending lectures and concerts, and sharing news and stories with old and new friends.

The Ecumenical Community of Chautauqua (ECOC), a not-for-profit corporation with a 501(c)(3) designation, was founded in 2003 to provide low-cost housing for clergy, religious workers and lay people of all faiths.

The Ministers' Union (MU) was founded in 1929 to provide low-cost housing to clergy, clergy families and religious workers attending Chautauqua Institution.

The MU and ECOC share many values, but are separate corporations with separate boards of directors.
