On a delightful summer day, many gathered in the street on South Terrace Avenue. Board members welcomed the gathering, read from Christian, Jewish and Islamic scriptures, gave a brief history of the ECOC, and offered a dedication prayer.

The McLarens told of their interest in the mission of the ECOC and their desire to honor Jared Jacobsen for his gift of music that inspires Chautauqua Institution. Jared spoke of how touched he was to have this honor.

Rev. Joan Brown Campbell, Director of the Department of Religion, gave the closing prayer, then visitors had an opportunity to tour the Jacobsen Room. 
My experience was the epitome of your mission—a lovely, comfortable and affordable room with a diverse, interesting group in the kitchen and the ECOC community to share it with.
