### **Going Green!**

o, we are not painting the outside of the buildings green! But the ECOC House Committee has been working towards "Going Green" during the last few years. We are trying to make our decisions about the buildings, programs and other matters with the goal of being sustainable environmentally and in sync with the earth ecologically and spiritually.

Efforts have included using nontoxic laundry and other cleaners, providing composting buckets in the kitchens, recycling, hosting programs related to the environment, beautifying ECOC grounds with gardens, providing space for bicycles, replacing incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescent bulbs, and purchasing Energy Star<sup>™</sup> replacement appliances.

We are also using interior décor that reflects the diversity of creation and using the diversity of our Godgiven gifts to live harmoniously with the earth and each other.

## Managers' Report

Hello, ECOC guests and friends. We are glad to report a good summer at the ECOC in 2014. We've had no accidents for two years now, the weather was cool, which is much better than too hot, and we were basically full except for Week 4.

The four of us were at the ECOC in early October to prepare the 2015 reservation mailing with registrar E. Carol. Over 800 envelopes were stuffed that day, and the mailing is all set to be mailed from the Chautauqua post office on the last working day of 2014. We sincerely thank E. Carol for her dedicated service this year.

While at the ECOC, we saw good progress on this year's off-season construction, which has begun. The side of the third floor of the Shaw building next to the Bird-Werner building has been gutted (stripped down to the wood framing). This includes Rooms 20 and 21, and the attic area where the fire exit had been. When the work is done, this floor will be connected to the Bird-Werner third floor, four steps up. This will allow much safer fire exiting. A new public bath and a larger Room 20 are also being added to the Shaw third floor. This will be accomplished by "raising the roof" of the old fire exit area. These changes are happening with Capital Campaign funds.

With the hospitality gifts, we replaced a broken washer and dryer, and added a second washer to our laundry room. We also added a knife block and knives for each kitchen, purchased a digital projector for use at our Monday Brown Bag Lunches, and bought a multifunction printer for the office.

The Brown Bag lunches were successful and well-attended in 2014, and we thank those guests who volunteered to present a topic. Look for a form

again this year with your reservation confirmation to volunteer to present.

We want to thank all of our outstanding hosts this year. Our surveys gave high praise for their ability to create a hospitable, caring, and really loving atmosphere in our kitchens and buildings. We'd also like to thank at least 50 volunteers who helped open and close the buildings. And last, but certainly not least, we'd like to thank our guests for being so congenial, caring, and contributing to the sharing and social atmosphere that is the ECOC.

We hope to see many of you again next year. We'll be back, same time, same station, and hope you will be, too.

# **Capital Campaign: Good News!**

e are close to finishing the first year of our three-year campaign, **Securing the Future**. As of November 1st, \$224,355 has been given or pledged, allowing us to reach 75% of our total goal for the campaign!

Our campaign funds are dedicated to creating better facilities in our three buildings without sacrificing any of their special historical qualities. Before the 2015 season begins, the newlycollected funds will be used to complete a fire exit bridge between Shaw and Bird-Werner plus add a dormer in Shaw to make a larger bedroom on the third floor. The fire exit in Shaw will be reconfigured and a new bathroom on the second floor will be added. In the fall of 2015 we plan a new front porch on the Bird-Werner, with a metal fire escape on the north side of the building. The central stairway in Bird-Werner will be closed and plans call for installing additional bathrooms in the new space.

The Ministers' Union (MU) was founded in 1929 to provide low-cost housing to clergy, clergy families and religious workers attending Chautauqua Institution.

The MU and ECOC share many values, but are separate corporations with separate boards of directors.
