I still remember the very first time we arrived at Chautauqua and drove down the narrow streets to find what was then called the Ministers' Union – now the Ecumenical Community of Chautauqua. We had wanted to come to Chautauqua for many years, and finally the time was right. Some friends who had stayed at the MU had told us all about it, and recommended it to us. Other friends who had attended Chautauqua just a week or so prior to our week had "scouted out" the place where we'd be staying. Their description: you will be able to roll out of bed and right into the Amphitheatre for morning worship!

We had many questions before we arrived that day. Would we be accepted? After all we were Canadians, and Anglicans. Would we fit into the Chautauqua community? Did we have the right clothes, the right food, the right expectations? Not to be daunted by our minor anxieties, we set out on our journey, and now we were here. And so much that was good about our first week centered around that place where we lived and ate and slept, right beside the Amphitheatre. Mr. Westervelt's vision of providing low-cost accommodation for clergy and church work-

ers was a true gift to us and a precious legacy for us to share. The friendly and helpful staff – Sandy was our Shaw kitchen hostess that year, so need I say more? The front-porch conversations, often carried into the kitchen during meal preparation, the simple comforts afforded, even the lineups for the shower, all did their part to help shape us into Chautauquans, but a special kind of Chautauquan – an ECOC Chautauquan.

This place we all call home during our Chautauqua weeks is indeed special and blessed. It is blessed by its purpose, still being fulfilled after so many years. It is blessed by the families who have shared in its administration and operation. It is blessed by the long line of faithful managers, hosts/hostesses, and staff. I arrived to find I was to be Aunt Eunice's GO-FER ~ take this to the 3rd floor, go check the Westervelt for blankets, take pillows upstairs, make sure sinks are not left running, and ... if you see anyone smoking—RUN AND GET ME! Uncle Edwin, on the other hand, was a fisherman. While I was there, he caught a muskalunge and hung it in the doorway of the Columbia (Shaw) kitchen! One could hardly get around it! He was so proud!

It was a busy summer, and I fell in love with Chautauqua... and I met my future husband that summer. I have returned every year to enjoy the fellowship of the community kitchens and the many friends... new and old. It is almost 70 years, and I still love it as if it were my first year!"

### Editorial Note

In this issue there are a number of references to the Ministers' Union. The Ministers' Union (MU), founded in 1929, was organized to provide low cost housing to clergy, clergy families and religious workers who attend Chautuauqua Institution. The current MU corporation is organized to preserve the rich historical contributions made to the Chautauqua community.

The Ecumenical Community Of Chautauqua (*ECOC*), a not-for-profit corporation with a 503C3 designation, founded in 2003, took as one of its' major purposes providing low cost housing to people of all faith communities while giving preference to clergy of all faiths, clergy families, and religious workers.

While the MU and ECOC are separate corporations with separate boards of directors, they do share many common values.
