Fund-raising Update

he Capital Fund Campaign of the ECOC is in the final eight months of a three-year effort to raise funds to renovate the buildings—restoring original facades, adding an elevator and modifying bedrooms for handicap accessibility, providing a larger gathering space, and updating wiring and plumbing.

As of the end of April, pledges have reached \$278,219. Gifts and payments on pledges total \$207,162, putting the campaign just 4% short of the goal for the time period.

Last February, letters were sent to 287 members of the ECOC community who had not donated or pledged. Some have responded with a final year gift. Chairperson Robert Boell hopes to reach \$300,000 by June 21, when the season opens. You can contact Bob at 801 Yale Avenue, #408, Swarthmore, PA, 19081; or email: bob.boell@ecunet. org.

In other news, last November the ECOC learned that their grant proposal to New York State was denied. But at about the same time, the fundraising effort received a boost of free publicity when an article about the Capital Campaign appeared in the fall issue of *The Chautauquan*.

In March, representatives from the Board met with Tom Becker, President of Chautauqua Institution, and Geof Follansbee, Vice President of Development, to bring them up-to-date on the fund-raising efforts and to ask for their support in reaching out to the larger Chautauqua community. The Chautauqua administration has been very supportive, although they can not offer any direct assistance. Geof Follansbee has graciously offered to help vet any leads on donors, and advise the Board about foundations in Jamestown. The Board is already working on a proposal to a foundation in Buffalo.

The MU and ECOC share many values, but are separate corporations with separate boards of directors.
