Message from the Board President

Hello! My name is Bill Brockman and I have the privilege of serving as President of the Board of Directors of the Ecumenical Community.

In 2009, members of our family will have been coming to Chautauqua for 50 years. My wife, Maggie, discovered Chautauqua as a college student and spent the summer of 1959 living in the Bird-Werner house. She and several other students lived on the fourth floor and cleaned the buildings to pay for their rooms. After we married in 1962, she and I spent one night during that season in the Shaw while traveling from San Francisco to Boston. As a family, we started coming regularly in 1968 and have missed only two Chautauqua seasons. Our daughter Beth and our son Bard stay every summer with their families. We are deeply indebted to the Ecumenical Community and the previous owners of the buildings, the Ministers' Union, for providing low-cost housing with rich community living in the midst of Chautauqua.

Everyone in the ECOC community is enormously pleased with the response from those within the ECOC family who have pledged nearly \$300,000 to begin the process of making our facilities more livable



and accessible. Taking the next step, members of the ECOC's Advisory Committee hosted intimate gatherings in their residences to share more about our mission to keep housing costs low. Many who attended shared their concerns that Chautauqua is becoming unaffordable for an increasing number of individuals and families. We will stay in contact with these concerned Chautauquans through our newsletter and by other personal contacts. Next summer we will continue the education process for the larger community.

I am deeply grateful to the members of our Advisory Committee. Their work on our behalf has resulted in a number of important contacts within Chautauqua and their efforts have raised awareness of how critical low-cost housing is to the future of a diverse Chautauqua. These wonderful people are Mig Boyle, Ted First, John Jackson, Toni and Joe Goldfarb, Katie Lincoln, and Margie Steere.

At the beginning of 2009 we will approach a number of foundations. We have engaged a consultant to assist us in the preparation of grant requests. In spite of the current news that the world is in the midst of a serious financial crisis, I am hopeful that we will raise \$1,000,000 during this phase of the campaign. As responsible stewards, we will keep our goals and priorities always in view, ensuring the most effective application of our construction dollars and the greatest outcome in support of the ECOC's mission. I invite you to share your thoughts with me throughout this process.
