Amp Renovation Begins

he Amphitheater renovation has progressed quite rapidly. By the end of September, the entire structure except the organ housing was demolished. Since then the excavation has been completed, and new foundations started. They expect to complete the foundations and start erecting the structural steel in November. - Completion of the porch projects including wood trim on the fire stairs railings.
- Remodeled outside stairs from the Shaw and Bird-Werner porches to the kitchen entrances.
- A new fire door on the first floor bridge between the Shaw and Bird-Werner.
- Addition of a half-bath in Bird-Werner Room 5, to be placed under the first floor stairs.
- Full baths added to Shaw Rooms 1, 2 and 14.
- Removal of the tub/shower and the addition of storage shelves in the bath behind the Shaw office desk.

Buildings Dedicated

he strikingly beautiful new facades of our buildings and our new Bird-Werner external fire stairs gave the occasion for a Blessing and Dedication Service for our recent building improvements.

The Rev. Bill Brockman presided at the ceremony on June 28, with opening remarks by Rev. David Matthews, then Board Vice President. The service was conducted during the Tuesday social from the newly renovated Bird-Werner porch, with the audience gathered on Roberts Street below. Joining the celebration were ECOC guests, managers,

staff, board members, Cook and Shaw family members and passers-by who were learning about the ECOC for the first time.

The audience was reminded that the Shaw and Bird-Werner buildings were originally a gift from Edward Westervelt in 1928. Then called the Ministers Union, it was created to provide low-cost housing to ministers and religious workers. In 2003 it became the Ecumenical Community of Chautauqua, offering low-cost inter-faith housing and fellowship for all.

Capital Campaign Draws to a Close

ecember 31, 2016, will mark the end of the three-year capital fund campaign *Securing* the Future. The Board set a goal of \$300,000. As of November 1, gifts and pledges totaled \$316,198.10 (105% of the goal); actual cash received as payment on the gifts and pledges totaled \$298,906.25. The Board and Managers express gratitude to the faithful giving of the ECOC community and some from the larger Chautauqua community who support the mission.

While the campaign officially closes at year-end, the capital fund account continues as a repository for those who

wish to donate to continuing needs. See other newsletter articles for the projects completed and those yet to be done pending funds available.
