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### **Make Love Your Aim**

I remember when I realized that "cogito, ergo sum" that is, "I think, therefore I am"—was less important

than "amo, ergo sum"-that is, "I love, therefore I am."

A student at the Ecumenical Graduate Institute in Switzerland, I was nominated by my 51 classmates from 32 different countries to preach at a worship we were to lead at the Ecumenical Centre. The worship leader was a woman from Rwanda named Mary. Mary was a physician educated and trained by the Red Cross. We developed a close friendship working together on this worship, the focus of which was reconciliation.

I put considerable thought into the issue of reconciliation. I interrogated the Bible. I investigated times when restitution necessarily accompanied reconciliation. I inspected the nuances that led some to seek retribution and reject reconciliation.

When Mary and I met, I told her what I learned. She listened politely. We found points of agreement and difference, and then Mary asked, quietly, if she could share something with me.

During the Rwandan Civil War, two of Mary's children, her husband, both parents, and two siblings were killed by the opposing tribe. But since Mary was a physician sanctioned by the Red Cross, she had to provide care for any injured person even when she knew they were from the tribe that murdered her family.

She said, "Nathan, I had to trust God's reconciling power. I had to give God's love all the room in my heart, and save nothing for hate. I had to. Otherwise, I could not live with myself."

That's when I realized that it's not thinking that gives us meaning, it is loving.

Don't get me wrong. I'm all for rigorous thinking. In fact, I posit that love liberates and never limits it.

But as 1 Corinthians suggests, "If I can fathom all mysteries and have all knowledge but do not have love, it profits me nothing."

That's why I'm glad to be part of the ECOC. We, at our better times, model this kind of inclusive, welcoming love. It's not just because we are nice. It's who we are. Even more, it reflects whose we are.

In a time so divided by allegiance to false gods such as money and power, by acts of lovelessness and hatred, and by lines drawn between people according to worldly standards, our witness to God's intended wholeness is needed now more than ever!

"Make love your aim." Indeed.

### Property Committee Hard at Work

Several building projects are planned for this winter. We plan to improve fire safety by installing smoke detectors in the Westervelt and Bird-Werner attics, installing fire-protective wallboard on the west end in the Westervelt attic, and placing Class K fire extinguishers in the kitchens.

For the comfort of our guests, we will be remodeling the Bird-Werner third floor small bathroom, putting a temperature control valve in the Bird-Werner first floor bathroom, and completing the installation of new flooring in the Bird-Werner second floor small bathroom. While these projects are relatively small this year, they are a part of our ongoing program to maintain and improve the ECOC. ■
